



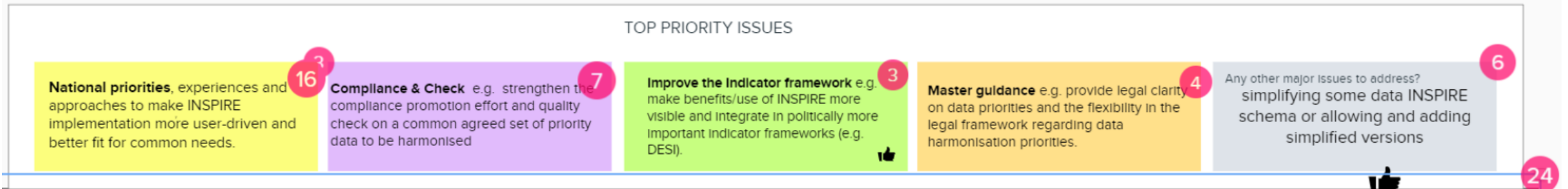

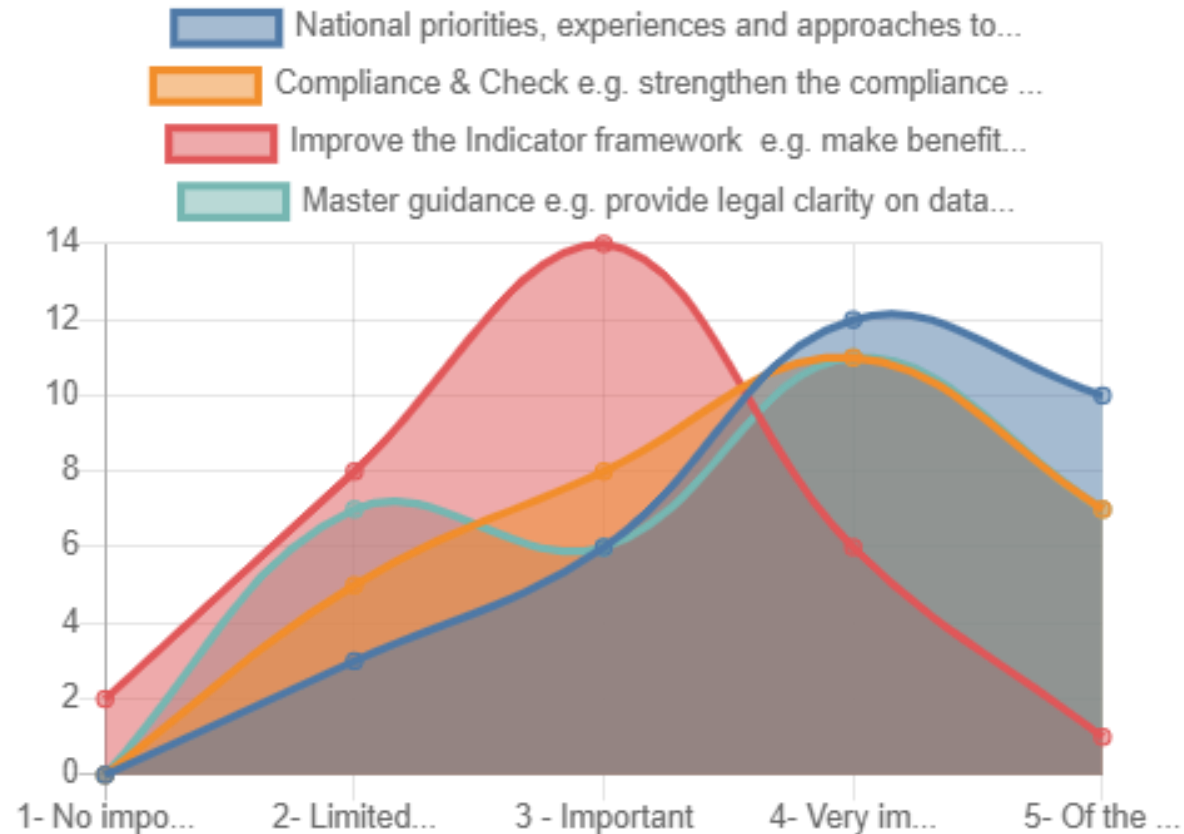
Roadmap for priority-driven implementation

Top priorities



- 5 top priority issues
 - **National priorities**, experiences and approaches to make INSPIRE implementation more user-driven and better fit for common needs.
 - **Compliance & Check** e.g. strengthen the compliance promotion effort and quality check on a common agreed set of priority data to be harmonised
 - **Improve the Indicator framework** e.g. make benefits/use of INSPIRE more visible and integrate in politically more important indicator frameworks (e.g. DESI).
 - **Master guidance** e.g. provide legal clarity on data priorities and the flexibility in the legal framework regarding data harmonisation priorities
 - **Flexible data specifications**

Very much in line with the outcome of the preparatory survey



Top actions

- **Data prioritisation should be user- and usage-driven**
- **Alignment with Open Data Directive and more specifically High Value Data sets**
- **Practical examples of compliant metadata, data and services**
- Once only – provide data only once and reuse (e.g. datasharing obligations, regulatory reporting)
- Legal clarity
- European Knowledge Centre on spatial data + Geospatial code of practice for quality assurance
- INSPIRE should be a subset of the national infrastructure instead off a parallel one
- The INSPIRE data structure must be similar to other EU initiatives so that INSPIRE data can be re-used without any modifications

GreenData4All

INSPIRE as an enabler for the Green Deal dataspace

- The European Data Strategy announces a 'GreenData4All' initiative as a driver for a possible review of the legal framework.
- Better availability and accessibility of environmental data will help to deliver on EU Green deal strategies.
- European Green Deal as political driver for developing a EU Green Deal data space.
- INSPIRE Directive is an important instrument for bringing data from public administrations into the Green Deal data space
- **Evaluate the INSPIRE Directive** and look at the coherence with the public access to environmental information Directive 2003/4/EC
- **Revision of the INSPIRE Directive** - politically validated (DG ENV, CAB Sinkevičius, CAB Timmermans)

State of Play

- The coming weeks we will be publishing the **INSPIRE evaluation Staff Working Document (SWD)** and its supporting documents on the Europa pages and the INSPIRE knowledge base. As part of the supporting documents we have already published [the report of the supporting study](#).
 - **Main conclusions:** The implementation of the INSPIRE Directive has matured, however still is incomplete. The objectives behind the INSPIRE Directive are still very relevant, the legal framework is no longer fit for purpose. Several parts of the Directive need revision.
- Call for Evidence for the Impact Assessment is under preparation and discussion. Overall timing of the GreenData4All initiative will be reviewed. Exploring and assessing the possible policy options in a soundly substantiated impact analysis and supporting studies will take more time and to fully exploit the opportunities of the new horizontal legal framework on digital data, the timing of the GreenData4All initiative would benefit from better alignment with other legal (Open Data Directive, Data Governance Act, Data Act,...) and non-legal initiatives (e.g. Digital Europe Programme Actions) on which it depends for its successful delivery.
- Aligning the existing legal framework with recent and emerging horizontal digital data legislation should maximize coherence with the larger ecosystem of the European Common Dataspaces, contribute to the development of a Green Deal data space and increase the potential for broad data reuse while minimizing implementation burden and promoting the once-only principle.

Possible ambition level for a review

- **Modernisation of the intervention and** render the intervention a key instrument to make the necessary data available needed to address environmental challenges (A Green Deal for Europe), increase environmental democracy and strengthen the emerging data economy (European Common data spaces).
- Establish a **coherent data ecosystem for data** sharing by pursuing maximal coherence with recent and emerging EU data legislation (Open Data Directive and its implementing Regulation on High Value datasets, Data Governance Act, Data Act).
- Effectively position the INSPIRE Directive in the emerging European data governance landscape as the key driver for **bringing public data into the Green Deal data space** and complement B2B, B2G and G2B data sharing covered by the Data Act with G2G data sharing.
- Make the **legal framework future and technology proof** and further simplify the minimal interoperability mechanisms in line with the European Interoperability Framework and common interoperability implementation strategies for the European Common data spaces.
- Establish a European **standardised framework for data reuse conditions and licensing**.

GreenData4All – indicative roadmap

- July 2022: publication of the evaluation Staff Working Document
- Q3 2022: Call for Evidence for public consultation (4 weeks)
- Q4 2022–Q1 2024 Impact Assessment study
- Q1 2023- Q2 2023 Public consultation
- ...

Amending Commission Regulation 1089/2010

The amending act to Commission Regulation (EU) No 1089/2010 as regards interoperability of spatial data sets and services has been translated in all EU languages. It will now be published on the [Comitology Register](#). This will kick off a period of 3 months of scrutiny by Parliament and Council after which we hope we can go forward with adopting the act. Once the translated versions are available on the Comitology Register, we will kindly invite you to have a review of the translation in your national language.

Indicative planning

- Written consultation 22/11/2021 – 10/12/2021 -> positive opinion
- Translation in all EU languages (May 2022)
- Scrutiny by co-legislators (3 months, starting when all language versions are available in the comitology register, ends earliest in September 2022)
- Adoption by the College. (earliest November 2022)
