Background and objective

3-Nitrooxypropanol (NOP) is a chemical compound, designed by Duval and Kindermann, which reduces CH4 emissions produced by the rumen from microbial fermentation. The aim of this study was to investigate the effects of NOP on enteric gas production, rumen fermentation, and animal performances depending on animal type using a meta-analysis approach.

Search strategy and selection criteria

All studies used in the meta-analysis were collected from the Google Scholar database using NOP, CH4, and ruminants as keywords. Not clearly defined.

Data and analysis

All statistical analyses were carried out using the PROC UNIVARIATE, PROC MIXED and PROC REG procedures of the SAS ver. 9.4. Outliers in the dataset were screened using an absolute studentized residual value (> 2) before conducting the statistical analysis.

Results

- 3-NOP supplementation linearly decreased CH4 production (g/kg DMI) of total ruminant (p < .0001, R2 = 0.744)
- The CH4 emissions in both beef and dairy cattle significantly decreased with increasing NOP supplementation (p < 0.0001, R2 = 0.797 and p = 0.0003, R2 = 0.916, respectively), however, the slope value in the linear regression for dairy is smaller than that for beef.
- The signifi- cant linear decrease in CH4, with increasing levels of NOP supplementation, was also observed in the long-term in vivo studies (p < 0.0001, R2= 0.910).

Conclusion

The study showed that supplementation of 3NOP was effective to a significant linear decrease in CH4 yield (g/kg DMI), regardless of animal type compared with those fed a diet without 3NOP.
