Purpose

- Understand the current status in terms of security management for the different PRIME members present at the meeting
- Understand the key challenges in terms of security encountered by the different PRIME members present at the meeting
- Based on current status / key challenges, identify key actions at the level of the EU to improve security management in the railway industry.

Key Findings

- One size does not fit all
 - Significant variety across IMs and rail industry
- Significant variety in domestic counterterrorism legislation

– None, some, dedicated.

 Terrorism is seen as the key security threat (but others waiting in the wings)

Key Message

It is essential to recognise that the situation differs significantly between countries.

 A one size fits all approach would therefore be counterproductive, and any new initiative at a European level should be scalable, adaptable and flexible. Above all, the EU should not seek to "reinvent the wheel", but should build on existing national good practice.

Some suggestions

- Facilitate best practice sharing for cross border cooperation (during and after incident) and exchange of information.
- Encourage scenario based mitigation planning (best practice with regards to mitigation measures in case of terrorist attack). Give a particular attention to <u>business</u> <u>continuity</u>
- Leverage successes in safety management for security management
- Re-enforce the principle of security by design (what kind of general security requirements need to be taken into account during designs) e.g. in the engineering Eurocodes.

Final thought

 PRIME will develop improved relations across the European (and wider) rail industry by building strong links with membership bodies (e.g. CER, UIC), the European structures and member states national transport/security bodies in order to share knowledge about security matters. Recognising that security is a national competence, PRIME will work with the European Commission to identify how the Commission can best add value to rail security by virtue of its supra-national links and competencies
